**FABER ANNOUNCES RELEASE OF STATE GRANT FOR  
ROADWORK IMPROVEMENTS IN SUPPORT OF  
CONTINENTAL CARBONIC PRODUCTS' EXPANSION IN GREENVILLE**

*COLUMBUS* –State Senator Keith Faber (R-Celina) today announced the state Controlling Board has approved the release of a \$150,553 Roadwork Development Grant to support roadwork improvements associated with the expansion of Continental Carbonic Products, Inc. (CCPI) in Greenville, a project that is expected to create 72 new jobs.

Specifically, the grant funds will be used to construct 650 feet of roadway and four curb inlets near the intersection of Jaysville-St. Johns Road and Sebring-Warner Road. CCPI is in the process of constructing a 50,000 square foot facility to house dry ice manufacturing operations, and is investing more than \$12 million in machinery and equipment, building construction and site preparation and land acquisition. The roadway is needed for CCPI's distribution activities and employee access to the facility, and will also open up the Greenville Industrial Park to further development and expansion. The City of Greenville has committed to funding the balance of the roadwork improvement costs.

“These roadwork improvements will not only assist CCPI, but will also help to support future development in the area,” Faber said. “I applaud CCPI for their decision to invest in their operations and expand in Greenville and appreciate the efforts of all those involved in moving this project forward.”

CCPI was founded in Chicago in 1976 and specializes in the manufacture and distribution of dry ice and liquid carbon dioxide as well as the sale and rental of blasting equipment. The company is the second-largest dry ice company in the United States.

In addition to the grant awarded today, CCPI has also been awarded a 45 percent, six-year Ohio Job Creation Tax Credit and a \$72,000 Rapid Outreach Grant in support of this project.

The Controlling Board also released \$1.45 million to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources for construction of the infrastructure necessary for the Hueston Woods State Park to connect to municipal water service. This includes the installation of main water lines, meter buildings and a telemetry system.
